Nominator(s) describe why nominee is deserving:

Kate is one of the most passionate and driven youth volunteers that I have come to know. Although I do not work with her directly in any of the organizations she volunteers with, I have had many occasions to talk to her about her volunteer work. Instead of travel I wanted to volunteer learning new skills in my area. I helped Stephen Coldwell who was working for Flower Cart on a grant. Present a Volunteer Link Proposal by having a meeting and one on one conversation with everyone in Kings County. Also, that year I volunteered as a phone worker for Valley Care Line which was in Middleton. As a volunteer we listened to and provided information for those with mental health concerns.

Being a family caregiver Doris Davidson and I started and begin being Co-facilitators of Kings County Caregiver Support Group in 2001 We met in New Minas Civic Center and Evergreen Nursing Home, but since Covid, is currently available by phone.
